

# Fair Rents (Scotland) Bill

## Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to protect private sector tenants by introducing measures to limit rent increases and to increase the availability of information about rent levels. The consultation runs from 15 May 2019 to 8 August 2019 (extended from 6 August). All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. However, the option also exists of sending in a separate response (in hard copy or by other electronic means such as e-mail), and details of how to do so are included in the member's consultation document. Questions marked with an asterisk (\*) require an answer. All responses must include a name and contact details. **Please explain the reasons for your response.**

I think this will be cost neutral for businesses as tenants are likely to spend their money in local businesses when they save on rent. Wealthy landlords are more likely to save their money from rents and less likely to spend it in local businesses. I think this will reduce costs for the public sector as it will reduce homelessness and other health issues (such as mental health problems) which stem from high rents and housing insecurity.
